From the Pastor's Desk



Brothers and Sisters in Christ-

Wow, a LOT has happened since I became your pastor! I've been very excited with the ministry that you were already doing that I have gotten to be a part of. You should be very proud of the work you do engaging our community and sharing the Good News of Jesus. It has been an honor getting to work with our amazing staff and dedicated lay leaders in partnership with the Holy Spirit to build God's Kingdom. I feel like we have all done a good job of keeping "the main thing the main thing."

One thing that is not the "main thing" but that has nevertheless been garnering some of our attention is the continuing conversation within the United Methodist Church about human sexuality and the very real and sometimes painful reality that some churches are exiting the denomination. Some are exiting because they wish the United Methodist Church would be more affirming in its stance toward homosexuality, and some are exiting because they see the UMC as becoming too progressive in that area.

I firmly believed that our special congregational meeting in October to address where the denomination stood and where we stood as congregation on these issues had given us clarity on what the right course was for St. Matthew. But in the last month two large congregations in the Oklahoma City Metro- St. Luke's in Mid-town and New Covenant in Edmond- both made headlines for disaffiliating, and since then I think we've all experienced a little more uncertainty as to what the future holds.

So, I'll reiterate the points I made at that October meeting:

1.) Disaffiliation is not a process that can be or should be initiated by the pastor. It is to be decided by the will of the congregation, not me.

2.) That being said, I think disaffiliation would be DISASTROUS for St. Matthew.

3.) First, the process of disaffiliation requires a 2/3 majority vote for churches to successfully disaffiliate per paragraph 2553 of the United Methodist Book of Discipline. When the congregation of St. Matthew was polled shortly before my arrival, only 53% said that they would be in favor of disaffiliating.

4.) Churches that take votes that DON'T pass almost universally experience immediate and disastrous decline in membership and giving. In fact, even in churches that DO pass a disaffiliation vote, there are still dangerous declines. Only churches that pass with a vote of more than 80% seem to be "safe."
5.) More than that, regardless of what "side" you're on, the person sitting next to you often isn't on the same side as you. Yet you've been worshipping together and doing ministry together for years! Can you imagine our church being what it is right now if every person you disagreed with suddenly stopped doing ministry? On any vote, some of those folks are leaving.

6.) There's also a financial component to all of this. Technically, St. Matthew doesn't own any of our property, the Oklahoma Conference of the UMC does. In order for us to disaffiliate and retain our property, the Conference would require us (per paragraph 2553 of the Discipline) to pay two years of apportionments and any unfunded liabilities related to clergy pensions and other denominational costs. This could cost St. Matthew as little as \$175,000.00 or as much as \$400,000.00. This would stretch the liquid assets that St. Matthew has available and strip the church of much of its ability to do viable ministry.

7.) The UMC hasn't officially changed its stance on human sexuality. In essence, it remains traditional and orthodox while affirming that every person is of sacred worth. This may satisfy some and disappoint others, and I get that. But I think that the inherent status quo undermines any arguments for disaffiliation as a reaction to what's been happening in the UMC. Essentially what's been happening in the UMC is the same thing that's been happening since language about human sexuality was introduced into the Discipline in 1972!

Those were the basic points I made in October. To reiterate, I have no leaning from the Spirit (nor authority per the Discipline) to lead this congregation through the disaffiliation process. Even the discernment process before the vote is often contentious and has a negative impact on the ministries of the church. But if it were the will of the congregation, I would still assist in the process as necessary.

That all being said, I have heard some concerns from one or two folks in the congregation that the foundational theological doctrines of the UMC are in the process of being eliminated - specifically, that the UMC will abandon historical doctrines of the Trinity, the resurrection of Jesus Christ, and the elimination of the Articles of Religion of the Church. At best, these assertions are conjecture or speculation. At worst, they're blatant falsehoods that these folks have been told that seem designed to evoke fear and distrust.

The Constitution of the UMC safeguards these historic doctrines and beliefs. I encourage you to review the Articles of Religion in ¶104 of the Book of Discipline. These articles contain the basic UMC doctrines. I also refer you to the Restrictive Rules of the UMC Contained in ¶¶17-22. Article I declares, "The General Conference shall not revoke, alter, or change our Articles of Religion or establish any new standards or rules of doctrine contrary to our present existing and established standards of doctrine." Article II states, "The General Conference shall not revoke, alter, or change our Confession of Faith."

The bishop of our Conference, Rev. James Nunn, is on record reiterating this statement in the Book of Discipline: "The UMC affirms that Jesus Christ is the Son of God, the Savior of the world, and the Lord of all" (¶121).

There's a lot of fear about the future of the UMC, and I get that.

But I wouldn't be here, and I wouldn't be advocating for us to stay in the UMC, if I didn't think there were also a lot of HOPE. God the Father has created us for a purpose. Jesus, the Son, has saved us and made us new for a purpose. The Holy Spirit is at work in our lives, guiding us and empowering us FOR A PURPOSE.

So let's keep the main thing (worshiping Jesus and building his Kingdom) the main thing!

After the long, cold winter we have experienced, it is great to see the buds on the trees and plants beginning to turn green. Hopefully we have turned a corner, and Spring will arrive at last! With Spring, our thoughts naturally turn to Easter. Holy Week and Easter will be here before we know it!

Our Children's and Program Director, Katelynn Henderson, needs many helpers for the Easter Eggstravaganza on Palm Sunday, April 2. In the past we have had hundreds of children. Please see Katelynn to sign up for a shift to help that day!

Palm Sunday is April 2. We will have the traditional Procession with the Palms in the 11:00 service. St. Matthew Children will join the Chancel Choir to sing *Celebrate the King!* in the 11:00 service.

Our traditional **Maundy Thursday Dinner** is April 6 at 6:30 pm in Wesley Hall. The menu for Maundy Thursday consists of foods that Jesus and his friends might have eaten: fish, beef, bread, honey, nuts, cheese, olives, dried fruit, fresh fruit. The tables are covered with cheesecloth. Food is eaten out of wooden bowls, and no silverware is used. The only light is provided by candles and natural light. The evening begins with the shared meal, and ends with communion. Reservations are required for this dinner, so we know how much food to buy, and how many places to set. The cost is \$10 for adults, \$5. for children 7 and under with a \$35. maximum per immediate family. Reservation deadline is Sunday, April 2.

Our Tenebrae Service, The Passion of Christ from the Gospel of John is 7:00 pm Friday, April 7. "Tenebrae" comes from the Latin word meaning shadow or darkness. During the service, candles are extinguished and the light gradually diminishes until the sanctuary is dark. The increasing darkness symbolizes the approaching darkness of Jesus' death and the hopelessness of a world without God. The Chancel Choir, Spirit Singers and speakers will present the events of the last week of Jesus' life in word and song. To truly appreciate Easter Sunday, it is necessary to walk with Jesus to the cross.

Easter Sunday! This year Easter Sunday will begin with a Sunrise service at 7am led by Pastor Jonathon. In addition, there will be two identical services at 8:30 am and 11 am in the Sanctuary. In addition to the great Easter hymns (Christ the Lord Is Risen Today and Up From the Grave He Arose), special music will be provided by the Spirit Singers and Chancel Choir. Chase Dealy returns to play trumpet with our hymns. After the sorrow of Good Friday, it's great to look forward to the rest of the story; "He is risen, He is risen indeed!"

Easter Brunch is 9:30-10:30 in Wesley Hall. Please bring food to share. We have to feed the multitudes! Help is also needed to set up on Saturday and clean up afterward on Sunday. Karren Brown volunteered to coordinate the brunch.

This is a wonderful time of the year to worship and grow closer to Christ. See you Sunday!
